INTRODUCTION:

The Zero Plastic Marina initiative takes local action on plastic pollution through a partnership of DEM, the RI Marine Trades Association and marina operators to keep plastics out of Narragansett Bay and off our ocean coastlines. This initiative is a <u>totally voluntary effort</u> to educate, prevent pollution, encourage recycling and clean the coastline by keeping plastics out of the environment. A menu of 10 pollution prevention action items have been developed by this partnership to help marina owners commit to and implement this program. This commitment to action complements, but is much more local, specific and action oriented than the Clean Seas Pledge.
