Asian Longhorned Beetle

Anoplophora glabripennis


Native of China, the Asian Longhorned Beetle was first introduced to New York in 1996. A pest of hardwood trees, it is currently being eradicated in Massachusetts, New York and New Jersey, and is **not yet present in Rhode Island**.

Identifying Features:

Adults are shiny black with irregular spots ranging from ¾ - 1½ inches long with antennae up to one to two times its body length. Alternating black and white bands are visible on antennae and may have a bluish tinge. Feet may also have this tinge. Active from early summer through mid-fall, adult females dig bowl-shaped holes ("ovipostition pits") in the bark of trees (approximately ½ inch in diameter) to bury their eggs. The pits often appear orange.

Larvae are segmented and can grow to 2.4 inches long. They burrow beneath the bark and are rarely seen. Their bodies are off-white and they have brown mouthparts.

Infested trees may have "frass" or sawdust apparent around the base. Exposed wood may be apparent on severely impacted trees.

Damage:

- Larvae cause damage by eating the outer sapwood, beneath the bark layer, thus creating hollowed out galleries in the wood.
- In depositing their eggs, females cause damage by chewing dimesized, oval grooves in the bark.
- Holes, at least 3/8 of an inch in diameter, are apparent where adults have bored out of the tree.
- Sap may ooze from wounds caused by the beetle.
