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DEMOLITION ON GOULD ISLAND

The United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) completed demolition and debris removal activities on the State-owned portion of Gould Island this past Spring. This part of Gould Island is classified as a Formerly Used Defense Site (FUDS) and the USACE is responsible for its investigation and remediation. All of the work was successfully completed prior to the start of bird nesting season in April. 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New Request for Proposals Expected Soon!

Brownfield Remediation & Economic Development Fund

The Office of Waste Management is finalizing Request for Proposals (RFP) for the next round of Brownfields Grants. The Office anticipates making 2.5 million dollars available for this grant round. The Brownfields Remediation and Economic Development Fund was created to encourage the reuse of brownfields throughout Rhode Island and is meant to provide funding assistance for remedial investigation, redevelopment, remedial design, construction of remedies, and other associated work. The new RFP will be similar to past rounds, and favor projects that bring permanent and temporary jobs and solar and renewable energy to Rhode Island brownfield sites. To address administrative delays, one new requirement, will be that the IRS W-9 form, Request for Taxpayer Identification Number and Certification, must be submitted with all applications.

This RFP should be posted on, or about, July 1, 2019 with the application period running through August 31, 2019. Plan ahead and look for a press release from RIDEM for more details.

Environmental Technical Assistance Contract

DEM's Environmental Technical Assistance Contract (TAC) or MPA 309, is up for renewal and should be released in early Summer. This contract is used to secure the services of environmental engineering and technical firms in providing technical assistance to RIDEM as required. The intent of the TAC is to pre-screen consulting firms for environmental work necessary in the State and be used on an as needed basis during its effective period. Proposals are sought for multi-disciplinary responsibilities generally including environmental monitoring, monitoring well installation, site investigations, remedial designs, technical reviews and project management for the Offices of Waste Management and Air Resources. The TAC consists of four cat-Environmental Assessment, Environegories: mental Remediation, Petroleum Assessment and Remediation, and Air Pollution Program technical assistance.

The current MPA 309 expires on December 31st, 2019, and the new RFP should be released by July.

The TBA program is in full swing this Spring, using its EPA 2016 Assessment Funding to prepare three Phase I ESA's, six Phase II ESA's, and two RAWPs under Hazardous Substances Funds, and two Phase II ESA's under Petroleum Funds. Upon successful completion of the RAWPs being prepared for two sites in Central Falls, the City and the Narragansett Bay Commission will begin remedial action to redevelop these sites into successful parks to benefit the Central Falls and neighboring communities. It is anticipated that redevelopment will begin in May. Redevelopment in target areas will improve quality of life and hopefully encourage other towns and cities to follow suite. New sites are always welcome to apply to the program for assessment work!

Block Island Sound to the West, freshwater wetlands to the North, the Block Island transfer station to the East and residential properties to the South.

Over several decades, climate change has caused storms and rising ocean levels to shear away at the shoreline. The frequent and intensifying storms have been washing away at the bluffs, unearthing what used to be the island's old landfill. Although 'before' photo shows exposed waste in direct contact with the ocean, the project has effectively placed approximately 2,600 tons of revetment stone to stabilize and protect the slopes from wave action and erosion. The project will also use 2 feet of clean capping material with a vegetative cover to reduce infiltration and be graded to direct stormwater off the landfill and into the naturally filtrating wetlands. Beach grass will soon line the slopes and top of the landfill, providing resilience to tidal forces and at the same time giving the former eye sore the ability to blend in with its natural surroundings once again.

house, once visible on the Southern tip of the island, was also demolished after it was determined that the boiler stack was not structurally sound. Both of these areas were cleared in order to allow access for the collection of samples in the Fall to address data gaps. A previously unknown underground storage tank used to store heating oil was also removed from the former maintenance garages. In 2018, the USACE initiated a site -wide sampling effort to define the nature and extent of contamination on Gould Island. This sampling effort consisted of collecting hundreds of soil samples, the installation and sampling of numerous groundwater monitoring wells, and the collection of sediment samples. A Restoration Advisory Board (RAB) was formed by the residents of Jamestown (Gould Island is considered part of Jamestown) and neighboring communities, a result of the overwhelming interest in the project.
